Loom Bands

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Powerful Practice

Reading is a skill and, as with every skill, it requires not just instruction but practice. Reading practice serves a number of purposes. It enables pupils to apply the skills and strategies that they are taught. It gives you opportunities to check their learning and identify any weaknesses. And, it draws pupils into the world of "real" reading - a world in which families learn from and enjoy books.

Practice does not automatically lead to growth, however. To be effective, practice must: be at the right level of difficulty, cover a sufficient amount of time, be guided by an instructor, and be enjoyable enough to sustain.

Reading remains a crucial part of the school curriculum. In response to parental and pupil feedback we have made some changes to home reading and homework at Shanklea Primary School.



Accelerated Reader

Accelerated Reader is a computer package which allows pupil to undertake quizzes to assess their comprehension. Pupils are able to earn rewards for these quizzes. The programme assesses the pupil's current reading level and suggests a selection of books from which they should choose. This means that reading practice is at the correct challenge to ensure maximum impact and progress.

We are trialling the use of Accelerated Reader within school and it will be used as follows:

Y5 and Y6	will read Accelerated Reader books all the time and complete quizzes as soon as they finish them.
Y2, 3 and 4	will take home an Accelerated Reader book every few books and will complete quizzes on these. The rest of the time they will continue with the Oxford Reading Tree.
EYFS and Y1	will continue with the Oxford Reading Tree with some free choice books sent home for sharing with their parents every couple of weeks.

Our Year 5 and 6 pupils have already started with this scheme and their first impressions are very positive. They enjoy choosing the books and are becoming very competitive over their quizzes and word counts!



Homework – Reading Journals and Learning Journals

Reading Journals

Key Stage 2 (Year 3 – 6)

In future English homework will be completed in the children's new Reading Journals. It is hoped these books will become a record of the children's enjoyment of reading and the progress they make.

Each week the children will be given a category of task by their teacher. Each category has a selection of tasks available. The children will then be allowed to choose which task they wish to undertake. These tasks should be based upon a book the child is currently reading. How the pupils complete the task is left to them to decide allowing pupils more independence and the ability to show initiative. We hope the children will be creative and the books will become a colourful and memorable record of their reading over the year and something of which they will be proud.

Pupils should still continue to have their reading records signed. Maths homework will continue to be a mix of online and written tasks.

Learning Journals

Key Stage 1 – (Year 1 and 2)

Pupils in Year 1 and 2 will receive an English and Maths task each week. One of these will be an online task and the other a task which requires a written response. The tasks will alternate from week to week.

Pupils will still receive spellings and reading books and parents are asked to continue to sign when they have read with their children.

We hope these changes will provide the pupils with inspiring and engaging learning opportunities for the family to share. If you have any queries about the above please speak to your child's teacher or Mrs Baxter.

Free School Meals

Free School Meals (FSM) are available to any full-time Shanklea pupil who is still at school and meet certain eligibility criteria You can get Free School Meals for your child if you or your partner gets:

- Universal Credit.
- Income Support.
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The Guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income of £16,190 or less, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs

Where a parent is entitled to Working Tax Credit during the four-week period immediately after their employment ceases, or after they start to work less than 16 hours per week, their children are entitled to free school lunches. Children who receive a qualifying benefit in their own right are also eligible to receive Free School Census

School Meals.

It is really important that you let the office know immediately if your child is eligible for FSM as there is a government census taken in school on Thursday and this decides all funding arrangements for the next academic year...
