
Forest Fire Safety


Year 6 Transition to Secondary Education

Reading at Shanklea

At Shanklea we use Oxford Reading tree as our main scheme for reading but encourage the pupils to read and share a wide range of books.

Reading Rewards

Reception through to Year 4 will continue to work towards Reading Rollercoaster certificates by reading each week. Year 5 and 6 will now work towards Accelerated Reader certificates by reading books and successfully completing certificates.

Tips for Reading for Enjoyment

Research shows the importance of reading to a child's overall success in life and how important reading enjoyment is to this. Families play a huge part in developing a child's love of reading. Here's how you can help.

- Ensure that your children see you reading it doesn't matter if it's a newspaper, a cookery book, computer manual, magazine - anything!
- Encourage children to join in ask your child to read recipes or the TV guides.
- Keep reading together the pupils have talked about their love of having stories read to them both in school and at home. Sadly many of our older pupils report that they never share a book with a family member anymore and they miss it.
- Don't panic if they read the same book over and over again we all have favourite books we remember reading as a child.
- Encourage your children to swap books with their friends. This will encourage them to talk and think about the books they read.
