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Y6 SATs - Easter Revision

All Year 6 children will have been given a differentiated pack of revision papers to help keep them busy during the Easter break and prepare for SATs tests in May.

Children do not need to complete the papers in one day but rather work steadily for 15 or so minutes each day. A little and often is better than a lot in one go to keep their skills on the boil.

When will KS2 SATs take place in 2019?

The Year 6 KS2 SATs will be administered in the week commencing 13 May 2019. The timetable is likely to follow previous years' timetables:

Monday 13th May 2019:

English grammar, punctuation and spelling Paper 1: questions

English grammar, punctuation and spelling Paper 2: spelling

Tuesday 14th May 2019: English reading

Wednesday 15th May 2019

Mathematics Paper 1: arithmetic

Mathematics Paper 2: reasoning

Thursday 16th May 2019: Mathematics Paper 3: reasoning

The previous national curriculum levels have been scrapped, and instead children are given scaled scores.

You will be given your child's scaled score and whether they have reached the expected standard set by the Department for Education ('NS' means that the expected standard was not achieved and 'AS' means the expected standard was achieved).

The range of scaled scores available for each KS2 test is:

80 (the lowest scaled score that can be awarded)

120 (the highest scaled score)

The expected standard for each test is a scaled score of 100 or more. If a child is awarded a scaled score of 99 or less they have not achieved the expected standard in the test.

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Keeping Children Safe Online

in primary school should not be using the app at all. Much like applications or devices which allow voice or video chat. Also other popular social networking sites and apps the age limit is put in place to protect children's privacy and to prevent them uses which allow internet access such as mobile phones and from being targeted with unsuitable advertisements.

CEOP provide information which may be helpful to consider when deciding whether to allow access to other sites:

It is important that we highlight the risks of these sites to both children and families (e.g. the age limits) and we all work together to give appropriate online safety advice.

E-Safety is an important part of keeping children safe. E-Safety is taught to all pupils which explains and demonstrates how to stay safe and behave appropriately online but we can only be successful in keeping children safe online if we work ogether.

Your help is needed to talk to your children about how they can keep themselves safe and behave appropriately online. It's important that we are all vigilant when children are using the internet and act to ensure they are protected from people who may pose a risk to them. Children can accidently or • deliberately be exposed to illegal, unwanted or unpleasant content, comments or activity online and there are steps you can take at home to minimise this risk.

The Golden Rules for e-Safety at home

Ground Rules

- Discuss as a family how the internet will be used in your house. Consider what information should be kept private (such as personal information, photos etc) and decide rules for making and meeting online friends. Ensure your children know the risks of accepting friends' requests from strangers online and make sure you know what your child is doing online much like you would offline.
- Discuss using strong passwords with your child so they understand how they can protect their online accounts. It's important they know they need to keep their passwords safeand not share them with anyone or use the same password for several accounts. If your child's account is "hacked" or compromised then make sure they change their password and report any concerns or suspicious activity. Online Safety

- Ensure that you understand how your children's devices work (e.g. can they download apps). Install antivirus software, secure your internet connection and phones and games consoles to block unsuitable sites, apps and games. content or contact.
- always 100% effective and sometimes unsuitable content can get past them, so don't rely on them alone to protect your child.

Dialogue

- Talk to your child and ask them to show or even teach you how they use the internet, learn which websites or tools they like to use and why. Learning together with your child can often open opportunities to discuss safe behaviour online. It's important that you know all of the sites and apps that your children are using and that you make sure they are suitable (e.g. read the sites' terms and conditions) and age appropriate.
- Ensure that your child knows that once a picture, video or comment is sent or posted online, then it can be difficult to remove and control as other people can forward it share it without them even knowing.
- Always ensure you and your child know how to block and report people online who may send nasty or inappropriate content.
- Explore privacy settings, help guidance and any information on the site for parents. Encourage your child not to retaliate or reply and to keep any evidence of cyberbullying messages.
- Make sure your child knows it's important that they tell an adult they trust immediately if anything happens online that makes them feel scared, worried or uncomfortable.
- Be realistic: banning the internet or web sites often will not work and it can make a child feel less able to report a problem or concern, so education around safe use is essential.
