

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#### **Year 1 Phonics Screening Test**

The Phonics Screening Test is a test given to children at the end of Year 1. The Phonics Screening Test (otherwise known as the "Year 1 Phonics Screening" or "Phonics Test") is a short phonics assessment.

The Phonics Test is a compulsory national test. It takes place in the second week of June at the end of Year 1. It is part of the national curriculum assessment programme. There is only one Year one phonics test.

The Phonics Screening Test seeks to test whether children have learned to decode words using phonics to the required level.

Children are expected to sound out and blend graphemes to read simple words. They are also required to read phonically decodable one-syllable and two-syllable words.

Some children might not meet the required standard for the Phonics Screening Test. If a child does not pass the Phonics Screening Check then they are required to take it again at the end of Year 2.

Please continue to read regularly to children over the holidays as it is important to help them to learn to love stories and books.

Making reading part of the everyday routine, so children quickly pick up subtle skills such as which way to follow the print of a book, how to use pictures to help decode the words, and how to recognise initial letters and the most commonly used words.

It's good to let them see adults reading too, surrounding the home with books, magazines and newspapers, as children learn by copying adults. Parents can share the stories they are reading and any funny parts or interesting nuggets to spark their interest.

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#### A gentle reminder about school uniform...

Thank you to all parents who make sure their children are in the proper school uniform. We are really proud of our school uniform and expect all children to wear it.

We have noticed increasing numbers of children who are not wearing the correct school uniform—mainly due to children forgetting what is and is not allowed.

It' is important for all children to wear practical, sensible and safe clothing and our uniform is right for the job.

#### We expect all children to wear school uniform as follows:

#### Clothes:

- Sweatshirts/Jumpers/Cardigans Maroon (Shanklea versions, including fleeces)
- Collared shirts or polo shirts White or Blue
- Skirts/Trousers Charcoal Grey/Black
- Plain Tights Grey/White/Black/
- Plain Socks Grey/White/Black

In the summer, children may wear charcoal grey/black tailored shorts.

Girls may also wear summer dresses or grey/black pinafore dresses.

#### Shoes:

All children should wear black, practical school shoes.

In the summer, black or white sandals can be worn.

If children come to school in boots, wellies or trainers, they should bring their school shoes to change into. We have a supply of black plimsolls for children who do not have the correct footwear.

#### Items which are not allowed:

Here's a list of some of the items which aren't allowed.

#### **Clothing:**

- Hooded tops/tracksuit tops
- Jeans/Leggings
- Sweatbands
- Long patterned socks
- Brightly coloured or patterned tights

#### Footwear:

- Trainers are not suitable for school wear and must not be worn during the day at school.
- Ugg boots or similar

Please note: only flat heeled shoes are allowed

Children may bring a pair of trainers into school to change into for break and lunchtime, if they expect to play ball games. They must change back into their school shoes once the break-time is over.

#### Make up and jewellery:

- No make-up is allowed
- Fake tattoos
- Nail varnish

If ears are pierced, only one pair of plastic insert studs may be worn for safety reasons. These should not be worn on PE days, but if they cannot be removed, they **must** be covered up with tape which each child should keep in their PE bag.

A wrist watch is allowed.

If your child is not wearing the correct uniform, we will contact you.

Students will be taken off roll if they are absent for more than fifteen school days and parents will need to re-apply to the Education Office for a Primary School place in Northumberland Local Authority
