We are taking on Buddy's Key Challenge in our classes, solving exciting maths puzzles in our class bubbles.



Good ones have stories, draw readers in, and make them want to read the book over and over again. These 10 books are all great examples of how numbers and











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words can combine to make a great book.

How do Dinosaurs Count to Ten? by Jane Yolen teaches young children to count from one to ten! Dinosaurs delight young readers with their playful antics.

A Hundred Billion Trillion Stars Book by Seth Fishman

Did you know that the earth is covered in three trillion trees? And that seven billion people weigh about the same as ten quadrillion ants? Our world is full of constantly changing numbers, from a hundred billion trillion stars in space to thirty-seven billion rabbits on Earth. Can you imagine that many of anything?

365 Penguins is a 2006 children's book by Jean-Luc Fromental and illustrated by Joelle Jolivet which tells the story of a family who receives a penguin each day for a year.

How Big Is A Million? by Anna Milbourne Pipkin the smallest penguin is always asking questions, but what he wants to know most of all is how big is a million. So he sets off to find out, and along the way meets 100 penguins, sees 1,000 snowflakes and meets one new friend before being amazed to finally find out how big a million really is

Elinor J. Pinczes's 'One Hundred Hungry Ants' (1993) follows the story of 100 hungry ants who are racing to a picnic far far away for some food

Spaghetti and Meatballs for Aall! by Marilyn Burns

Mr. and Mrs. Comfort are having a family reunion! Mr. Comfort starts cooking up his famous spaghetti and meatballs, while Mrs. Comfort carefully arranges eight tables and thirty-two chairs so that everyone will have a seat.

100th Day Worries Book by Margery Cuyler

Jessica is a worrier. She worries about everything, and that includes what to bring to class for 100th Day. Nothing she can think of seems right. 100 ice cubes? Too melty. 100 marshmallows? Too sticky. 100 toothpicks? Too pointy.

The Grapes of Math by Greg Tang.

This innovative and delightful book challenges children and parents to open their minds and solve problems in new and unexpected ways.

Pigs Will Be Pigs: Fun with Math and Money by Amy Axelrod
